The Services

Starting at 20:00 Monday to Wednesday we will be watching the film The Passion of Christ followed by Compline.

Thursday sees the commemoration of the Last Supper with the washing of feet, (please come prepared to join in with this). After the Eucharist we keep watch at the Altar of Repose, reliving the events of the Garden at Gethsemane. Do not worry about falling asleep, it is authentic! At midnight we will wake you up if necessary before locking up and going home.

Friday sees the Churches Together walk of witness in the late morning but at 14.00 we have the first of our two services, when we relive the crucifixion and Jesus's death. Then at 19.30 we have the Maria Desolata. This is a very moving re-enactment of Mary and the beloved disciple returning home after the burial of Jesus, recalling the events of that day as they retrace their steps of earlier in the day.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, during Lent we have been preparing by works of love and self-sacrifice for the celebration of our Lord's death and resurrection. Today we come together to begin this solemn celebration in union with the Church throughout the world. Christ enters his own city to complete his work as our Saviour, to suffer, to die and to rise again. Let us go with him in faith and love, so that, united with him in his sufferings, we may share his risen life.

The people hold up palms or branches while this prayer is said by the president:

God our Saviour, whose Son Jesus Christ entered Jerusalem as Messiah to suffer and to die; let these palms be for us signs of his victory (*The palms are sprinkled*) and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit,





Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the apostles, martyrs and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.


