

To all of you who are God's beloved and called to be saints, grace and peace from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ. and also with you.

# ¶ Remain standing for the **Introduction**

Today, on the Feast of all Saints, we celebrate in a way our own feast: namely, what we have been called to be, what we hope to become and what so many have been before us: people who somehow embody Christ, who show a little of his face to others, men, women and children who make God visible and tangible and human. Not that we want to pull down God to our level, but that through our humanity we show a glimpse of God. It is so little we show of him, and we thank all the nameless people who brought others a bit nearer to God. Let us celebrate that victory with joy.

# ¶ Remain standing for the **Penitential Rite**

Christ calls us to share the heavenly banquet of his love with all the saints in earth and heaven. Knowing our unworthiness and sin, let us ask from him both mercy and forgiveness.

We pause for a moment to reflect on our own shortcomings

Lord Jesus, all praise to you for the blessed poor and the gentle, who lived with you in God's hands.

Lord have mercy.



Jesus Christ, all praise to you for the blessed merciful and the peacemakers, who brought people together in your name. Christ have mercy.




Lord Jesus, all praise to you for the blessed seekers of sanctity and justice, who revealed your own holiness and love. Lord have mercy.

# ¶ Remain standing for the Gloria in excelsis

¶ Remain standing for the **Collect** 

The priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

God of holiness, your glory is proclaimed in every age: as we rejoice in the faith of your saints, inspire us to follow their example with boldness and joy; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.** 

# ¶ The Liturgy of the Word

¶ Sit for the **First Reading** (Daniel 7: 1–3, 15–18)

At the end the reader says:

This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

¶ Please stand for the **Responsorial Psalm** (Ps. 149)

and join in singing the Response

Response and Chant: MHE



Sing a new song to the Lord, his praise in the assembly of the faithful. Let Israel rejoice in its Maker, let Sion's sons exult in their king. (Response)

Let them praise his name with dancing and make music with timbrel and harp. For the Lord takes delight in his people. He crowns the poor with salvation. (Response)

Let the faithful rejoice in their glory, shout for joy and take their rest.

Let the praise of God be on their lips and a two-edged sword in their hand, (Response)

To deal out vengeance to the nations and punishment on all the peoples; to bind their kings in chains and their nobles in fetters of iron; to carry out the sentence pre-ordained: this honour is for all his faithful. (Response)



¶ Remain seated for the **Second Reading** (Ephesians 1: 11–23)

At the end the reader says:

This is the word of the Lord:

Thanks be to God.

# ¶ Stand for the Gospel Acclamation

and turn towards the Gospel reader



Cantor: Come to me, all you who labour and are overburdened,

and I will give you rest, says the Lord.

All: Alleluia (as above)

¶ Remain standing for the **Gospel** (Luke 6: 20–31)

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end of the Gospel the reader says: This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

# ¶ Stand for the Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

Please bow for the next three lines:

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

Amen.

# ¶ Kneel or sit for the **Prayers of Intercession**

The priest introduces the prayers.

To the bidding Lord, in your\_mercy.

Please respond by saying **Hear our prayer**.

After the prayer for the faithful departed the intercessor says: Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord

And let light perpetual shine upon them.

May they rest in peace

and rise in glory.

Silence is kept and the priest says a concluding prayer.

# ¶ The Liturgy of the Sacrament

¶ Stand for the **Peace** 

We are fellow-citizens with the saints and of the household of God, through Christ our Lord, who came and preached peace to those who were far off and those who were near.

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

# ¶ Remain standing for the Offertory Hymn

A collection is taken for the mission and upkeep of the Church. The Altar is prepared and gifts of bread and wine are placed on it.

Who are these like stars appearing,
These before God's throne who stand?
Each a golden crown is wearing;
Who are all this glorious band?
Alleluia, hark! they sing,
Praising loud their heavenly King.

Who are these of dazzling brightness,
These in God's own truth arrayed,


# ¶ Remain standing for the Prayer over the Gifts


Pray, my brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father.

# ¶ Remain standing throughout the Eucharistic Prayer (B)






It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

And now we give you thanks, most gracious God, surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses and glorified in the assembly of your saints. The glorious company of Apostles praise you. The noble fellowship of Prophets praise you. The white-robed army of Martyrs praise you. We, your holy Church, acclaim you.

In communion with angels and archangels, and with all who served you on earth and worship you now in heaven, we raise our voice to proclaim your glory, for ever praising you and singing:



Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: 'Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.'

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: 'Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me'.

#### Great is the mystery of faith:



And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.

As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Apostles, the Martyrs, and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

By whom and with whom and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.



# ¶ Remain standing for the Lord's Prayer

Jesus taught us to call God our Father, and so we have the courage to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

# ¶ Remain standing for the **Breaking of the Bread**

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.


# ¶ Remain standing for the **Invitation to Communion**

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

#### **Distribution of the Sacrament**

Anyone who has been baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and wishes to receive the love of the Lord Jesus in their life, is welcome to receive communion at this service. The Chalice is there for those who wish to receive it. There is no compulsion about this. If you are worried about receiving the Chalice, please remember that making your Communion in one kind is entirely valid. We ask you not to dip the wafer into the chalice.

Alternatively you may wish to come for a blessing: please keep your hands down and your head bowed to indicate that this is your preference.

# ¶ Remain kneeling or seated for the **Communion Motet**

God, the source of all holiness and giver of all good things: may we who have shared at this table as strangers and pilgrims here on earth be welcomed with all your saints to the heavenly feast on the day of your kingdom; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
