

Introduction to the Season

Advent is a season of expectation and preparation, as the Church waits for the coming (adventus) of Christ, both in his incarnation and as judge at the end of time. The readings and liturgies therefore look forward not only to Christ's birth, but also to his final Coming, and challenge the modern reluctance to confront the theme of divine judgement: 'Every eye shall now behold him robed in dreadful majesty.' (Charles Wesley)

The characteristic note of Advent is expectation rather than penitence, although the character of the season is easily coloured by an analogy with Lent. The anticipation of Christmas under relentless commercial pressure has also made it harder to sustain the appropriate sense of alert watchfulness. Church decorations are simple and spare, and purple is the traditional liturgical colour. In the northern hemisphere, the Advent season falls at the darkest time of the year and the natural symbols of darkness and light are powerfully at work throughout Advent and Christmas. The lighting of candles on an Advent wreath was imported into Britain from northern Europe in the nineteenth century and is now a common practice.

The Advent Wreath has four candles (three purple and one rose pink) in a ring around a white candle. The first purple candle is lit on Advent Sunday, with the others being lit on successive weeks; the pink candle is lit on the Third Sunday ('Gaudete') which signifies the rejoicing that we are at the midpoint of the season and the focus shifts form the ancient message of the prophets to the forerunner of Christ, John the Baptist. The white candle is lit on Christmas Day Itself. The new candle each week is lit during the Prayers of Penitence.

There are several traditions about the meaning or theme of each candle. The scheme that accords best with the Common Worship Lectionary as used in the Church of England is:

Advent 1: The Patriarchs
Advent 2: The Prophets
Advent 3: St John the Baptist
Advent 4: The Blessed Virgin Mary

Each of the four Sundays thus reminds us of those who prepared for the coming of Christ. 'The Patriarchs' can naturally focus on Abraham, our father in faith, and David, Jesus's ancestor, in whose city he was born. 'The Prophets' gives an opportunity to reflect on the way the birth of the Messiah was 'foretold'. John, who proclaimed the Saviour, and Mary, who bore him in her womb, complete the picture.

¶ Stand when the bell is rung for the **Processional Hymn**

From cosmic dust our universe expanding Revealed your glory, Lord, in all you made. From primal myths, our growth in understanding Gave rise to faith, and worship unafraid. Then came your Christ, all history fulfilling: God of past ages, praise to you be paid.

In human care, in new collaboration,
To bring to fruit a world of love and peace;
In working for the full eradication
Of greed that spoils, so sharing may increase,
Your Spirit leads, our constant inspiration:
God of this moment, praise will never cease.

To the unknown, in this world and in heaven, We look with faith, for all is in your care; To where you call, that we may be the leaven By which the kingdom grows that all may share; Lead us, our Father, where you want and need us: God of tomorrow, praise will fill our prayer.

¶ Remain standing for the Invocation and Greeting

† In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

I welcome you with the greeting of St Paul: grace and peace to you from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

¶ Remain standing for the **Introduction**

During this Advent we are confronted again with the question so vital for us as Christians. What place are you giving Christ in your life? Do you feel close to him? Can we feel that he is near to us, and do we try to recognise him in the many forms he is present among us: in our neighbour, in nature, in the events of life, even in our troubles and his own silence? We have become vigilant to his presence, not only in our little world, but in the Church and wider society in the world. Today we pray in the eucharist: come, Lord, come: be visible and present among us.

¶ Remain standing for the **Lighting of the Advent Wreath**

People of God: awake! The day is coming soon when you shall see God face to face. Remember the ways and the works of God. God calls you out of darkness to walk in the light of his coming. You are God's children.

The First candle is lit.

Lord, make us one as we walk with Christ today and for ever. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the **Penitential Rite**

Do we look for the lord? And when we find him, do we point him out to others? Let us examine ourselves before the Lord.

We pause for a moment to reflect on our own shortcomings.


Heavenly Father, you have created a universe of light: forgive us when we return to darkness.



Lord Jesus, you are the light of the world: cleanse and heal our blinded sight.



Holy Spirit, you give us light in our hearts: renew us in faith and love.



Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you, † pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

¶ Remain standing for the Collect

The priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness and to put on the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which your Son Jesus Christ came to us in great humility; that on the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

¶ The Liturgy of the Word

¶ Sit for the **First Reading** (Isaiah 2: 1–5)

At the end the reader says:

This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

¶ Remain seated for the **Responsorial Psalm** (Ps. 122)

and join in singing the response
Response and Chant: MHE



I rejoiced when I heard them say:

'Let us go to God's house.'

And now our feet are standing

within your courts, O Jerusalem. (Response)

Jerusalem is built as a city strongly compact.

It is there that the tribes go up,

the tribes of the Lord. (Response)

For love of my brethren and friends

I say: 'Peace upon you!'

For love of the house of the Lord

I will ask for your good. (Response)

¶ Remain seated for the **Second Reading** (Romans 13: 11–14)

At the end the reader says:

This is the word of the Lord

Thanks be to God.

¶ Stand for the Gospel Acclamation

and turn towards the Gospel reader



Cantor: Let us see, O Lord, your mercy

and give us your saving help.

All: Alleluia (as above)

¶ Remain standing for the **Gospel** (Matthew 24: 36–44)

The Lord be with you

and also with you.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end of the Gospel the reader says:

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

¶ Stand for the Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from

Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

Please bow for the next three lines:

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

¶ Kneel or sit for the **Prayers of Intercession**

The priest introduces the prayers.

To the bidding Let us pray to the Lord please respond by singing:



After the prayer for the faithful departed the intercessor says:

Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord

And let light perpetual shine upon them.

May they rest in peace

and rise in glory.

Silence is kept and the priest says a concluding prayer.

¶ The Liturgy of the Sacrament

¶ Stand for the **Peace**

In the tender mercy of our God, the dayspring from on high shall break upon us, to give light to those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace. The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

¶ Remain standing for the **Offertory Hymn**

A collection is taken for the mission and upkeep of the Church. The Altar is prepared and gifts of bread and wine are placed on it.

¶ Remain standing throughout the Eucharistic Prayer (A)



It is indeed right and good to give you thanks and praise, almighty God and everlasting Father, through Jesus Christ your Son. For when he humbled himself to come among us in human flesh, he fulfilled the plan you formed before the foundation of the world to open for us the way of salvation. Confident that your promise will be fulfilled, we now watch for the day when Christ our Lord will come again in glory. And so we join our voices with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven, for ever praising you and singing:



Cantor: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

All: Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest. (as above)

Accept our praises, heavenly Father, through your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ, and as we follow his example and obey his command, grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit these gifts of bread and wine may be to us his body and his blood;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Therefore, heavenly Father, we remember his offering of himself made once for all upon the cross; we proclaim his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; we look for the coming of your kingdom, and with this bread and this cup we make the memorial of Christ your Son our Lord.

Accept through him, our great high priest, this our sacrifice of thanks and praise, and as we eat and drink these holy gifts in the presence of your divine majesty, renew us by your Spirit, inspire us with your love and unite us in the body of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven we worship you Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:



¶ Remain standing for the Lord's Prayer

Jesus taught us to call God our Father, and so we pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the Breaking of the Bread

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.


Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

¶ Remain standing for the Invitation to Communion

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

¶ Kneel or sit for the Lamb of God



Distribution of the Sacrament

Anyone who has been baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and wishes to receive the love of the Lord Jesus in their life, is welcome to receive communion at this service. The Chalice is there for those who wish to receive it.

There is no compulsion about this. If you are worried about receiving the Chalice, please remember that making your Communion in one kind is entirely valid.

We ask you not to dip the wafer into the chalice.

Alternatively you may wish to come for a blessing: please keep your hands down and your head bowed to indicate that this is your preference.

¶ Remain kneeling or seated for the Communion Hymn
