The Priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

Lord Jesus Christ, your birth at Bethlehem draws us to kneel in wonder at heaven touching earth: accept our heartfelt praise as we worship you, our Saviour and our eternal God. **Amen.**

¶ The Liturgy of the Word

¶ Sit for the **Bible Readings** (Isaiah 9: 2–7 & Titus 2: 11–14)

At the end of each the reader says: This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

¶ Stand for the Gradual Hymn

Hark! the herald-angels sing
Glory to the new-born King;
Peace on earth and mercy mild,
God and sinners reconciled:
Joyful all ye nations rise,
Join the triumph of the skies,
With the angelic host proclaim,
Christ is born in Bethlehem.

Hark! the herald angels sing

At the end of the Gospel the reader says: This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

¶ Stand for the Profession of Faith

(from the Athanasian Creed)

God, of the being of the Father, the only Son from before time began; human from the being of his mother, born in the world; fully God and fully human; human in both mind and body.

As God he is equal to the Father, as human he is less than the Father.

Although he is both divine and human
he is not two beings but one Christ.

One, not by turning God into flesh, but by taking humanity into God; truly one, not by mixing humanity with Godhead, but by being one person.

For as mind and body form one human being so the one Christ is both divine and human.

The Word became flesh and lived among us; we have seen his glory, the glory of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth.

¶ Stand for the Peace

Unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given and his name shall be called the Prince of Peace. The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

During the following Carol a collection is taken to benefit local charities.. The Altar is prepared and gifts of bread and wine are placed on it.

¶ Remain standing for the **Offertory Hymn**

¶ Remain standing throughout the Eucharistic Prayer (E)

The Lord be with you

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

All glory and honour be yours always and everywhere, mighty creator, ever-living God. We give you thanks and praise for your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, who for love of our fallen race humbled himself, was born of the Virgin Mary by the power of your Spirit, and lived as one of us.

In this mystery of the Word made flesh you have caused his light to shine in our hearts, to give knowledge of your glory in the face of Jesus Christ. In him we see our God made visible and so are caught up in the love of the God we cannot see.

Therefore with all the angels of heaven we lift our voices to proclaim the glory of your name and sing our joyful hymn of praise:

Blest is he who comes, who comes in the name of the Lord of heaven, the God of life and love. Gloria, Hosanna in the highest.


We praise and bless you, loving father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord; and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit, that broken bread and wine outpoured may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you. He broke the bread, gave it to them and said: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:



Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth. Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with the Blessed Virgin Mary and all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

¶ Remain standing for the Lord's Prayer

Jesus taught us to call God our Father, and so we say:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the Breaking of the Bread

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ. Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

¶ Remain standing for the **Invitation to Communion**

Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to the supper of the Lamb. Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

¶ Kneel or sit for the Lamb of God

While the Altar Party receives the Sacrament, the choir leads the singing of the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God). Please join in singing the response at the end of each verse:

Choir: Jesus, Lamb of God, the Word made flesh; lesus, Son of God come down on earth:



hear our prayer, have mer-cy, hear our prayer, have mer-cy, give us your peace

Choir: Jesus, King of glory, Prince of peace;

Jesus, shining in our darkened world:

All: Hear our prayer, have mercy...

Choir: Jesus, King of angels, Lord of joy;

Jesus, born to save the world from sin:

All: Hear our prayer, have mercy...

Distribution of the Sacrament

Anyone who has been baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and wishes to receive the love of the Lord Jesus in their life, is welcome to receive Communion at this service. The Chalice will be offered for those who wish to receive in both kinds. There is no compulsion about this. If you are worried about receiving the Chalice, please remember that making your Communion in one kind is entirely acceptable.

<u>Intinction</u> is the practice of dipping the bread wafers into the wine.

This has implications for those who are gluten intolerant because traces of gluten are more likely to enter the wine.

We therefore ask you **not to dip the wafer into the chalice**.

Alternatively you may wish to come for a blessing: please keep your hands down and your head bowed to indicate that this is your preference.

¶ Remain kneeling or seated for the Communion Hymn

Away in a manger, no crib for a bed, The little Lord Jesus laid down his sweet head. The stars in the bright sky looked down where he lay, The little Lord Jesus asleep on the hay.
