¶ Sit for the First Reading (Acts 4: 32–35)

At the end the reader says: This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

¶ Remain seated for the Responsorial Psalm (Ps. 133)

and join in singing the Response

Response and Chant: MHE



It is like precious oil upon the head, running down upon the beard, running down upon Aaron's beard, upon the collar of his robes. *(Response)*

It is like the dew of Hermon, which falls on the heights of Zion. For there the Lord gives his blessing, life for ever. (*Response*)

¶ Remain seated for the Second Reading (1 John 1: 1-2: 2)

At the end the reader says: This is the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

¶ Stand for the Gospel Acclamation

and turn towards the Gospel reader



Cantor: Jesus said: 'You believe because you can see me.Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe.'ALL: Alleluia (as above)

¶ Remain standing for the Gospel Reading (John 20: 19–31)

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end of the Gospel the reader says: This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**

¶ Sit for the **Sermon**

¶ Stand for the **Nicene Creed**

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

Please bow for the next three lines:

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

¶ Kneel or sit for the **Prayers of Intercession**

As children of a loving God who always listens to our cries, let us pray to our Father in heaven.

To the bidding Lord, in your mercy Please respond by saying **Hear our prayer.**

At the end of the prayers the Priest introduces a period for silent reflection after which he says:

Jesus, the resurrection and the life, we give you thanks for all who have lived and believed in you ... Raise us with them to eternal life.

Jesus, Lord of life, in your mercy, hear us, accept our prayers, and be with us always. Amen.

¶ The Liturgy of the Sacrament

¶ Stand for the Peace

The risen Christ came and stood among his disciples and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then were they glad when they saw the Lord, Alleluia.

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

¶ Remain standing for the **Offertory Hymn**

Blessed Thomas, doubt no longer, See the wounds in hand and side,Now behold the risen SaviourWho for thee has bled and died,And from death's dark pit arisingLives in body glorified.

Here behold the love victorious, Over death triumphant now, See the feet where nails were driven, And thy faith in him avow: For he lives, the world's redeemer, Unto whom all knees shall bow.

¶ Remain standing for the Eucharistic Prayer

The Lord is here His Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

We give you thanks and praise for the Gospel we have received. Christ died for our sins. Alleluia!

He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Death comes to all through Adam, and sin reigns for a time. New life without end comes through Christ, and he reigns for ever. Alleluia!

We have been crucified with Christ, and live his risen life, to praise you for ever with angels and archangels.



We praise and bless you, loving Father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord; and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit, that broken bread and wine outpoured may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son. On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you. He broke the bread, gave it to them and said: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, In remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

¶ Remain standing for the Lord's Prayer

Jesus taught us to call God our Father, and so we have the courage to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the Breaking of the Bread

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

¶ Remain standing for the Invitation to Communion

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

¶ Kneel or sit for the Lamb of God

Distribution of the Sacrament

Anyone who has been baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and wishes to receive the love of the Lord Jesus in their life, is welcome to receive Communion at this service. Alternatively you may wish to come for a blessing: please keep your hands down and your head bowed to indicate this.

<u>Intinction</u> is the practice of dipping the bread wafers into the wine. This has implications for those who are gluten intolerant because traces of gluten are more likely to enter the wine. We therefore ask you **not to dip the wafer into the chalice**. Please remember that making your Communion in one kind is entirely acceptable.

¶ Remain kneeling or seated for the **Communion Hymn**

From heaven you came, helpless babe, Entered our world, your glory veiled; Not to be served but to serve, And give your life that we might live.
