The Priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

Almighty Father, who in your great mercy gladdened the disciples with the sight of the risen Lord: give us such knowledge of his presence with us, that we may be strengthened and sustained by his risen life and serve you continually in righteousness and truth; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Amen.

¶ The Liturgy of the Word

¶ Sit for the **First Reading** (Acts 3: 12–19)

At the end the reader says: This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

¶ Remain seated for the **Responsorial Psalm** (Ps. 4) and join in singing the Response



When I call, answer me, O God of justice; from anguish you released me, have mercy and hear me! (Response)

It is the Lord who grants favours to those whom he loves; the Lord hears me whenever I call him. (Response) 'What can bring us hap-pi-ness?' many say. Lift up the light of your face on us, O Lord. (Response)

I will lie down in peace and sleep comes at once, for you alone, Lord, make me dwell in safety. (Response)

¶ Remain seated for the **Second Reading** (1 John 3: 1–7)

At the end the reader says:

This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

¶ Stand for the **Gospel Acclamation**and turn towards the Gospel reader



Cantor: Lord Jesus, explain the scriptures to us.

Make our hearts burn within us as you talk to us.

All: Alleluia (as above)

¶ Remain standing for the **Gospel** (Luke 24: 36b–48)

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end of the Gospel the reader says:

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

¶ Stand for the Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

Please bow for the next three lines:

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

¶ Kneel or sit for the Prayers of Intercession

As children of a loving God who always listens to our cries, let us pray to our Father in heaven.

To the bidding Lord, hear us.

Please respond by saying Lord, graciously hear us.

At the end of the intercessions the Priest introduces a period for silent reflection, after which he says:

Jesus, the resurrection and the life, we give you thanks for all who have lived and believed in you ... Raise us with them to eternal life. Jesus, Lord of life, in your mercy, hear us, accept our prayers, and be with us always. Amen.

¶ The Liturgy of the Sacrament

¶ Stand for the **Peace**

The risen Christ came and stood among his disciples and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then were they glad when they saw the Lord. Alleluia.

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

¶ Remain standing for the **Offertory Hymn**

A collection is taken for the mission and upkeep of the Church. The Altar is prepared and gifts of bread and wine are placed on it.

Christ the Lord is risen again!
Christ has broken every chain!
Hark, the angels shout for joy,
Singing evermore on high: Alleluia!

He who gave for us his life, Who for us endured the strife, Is our Paschal Lamb today! We too sing for joy and say: Alleluia!

He who bore all pain and loss Comfortless upon the cross, Lives in glory now on high, Pleads for us, and hears our cry. Alleluia!

He whose path no records tell, Who descended into hell; Who the strong man armed hath bound, And in highest heaven is crowned. Alleluia!

Now he bids us tell abroad How the lost may be restored, How the penitent forgiven, How we too may enter heaven. Alleluia!


¶ Remain standing for the **Prayer over the Gifts**

Pray, my brothers and sisters that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father.


May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of his name, for our good, and the good of all his holy Church.

Risen Lord Jesus Christ, we believe you, and all we have heard is true. When you break bread may we recognise you as the fire that burns within us, that we may bring light to your world. **Amen.**

¶ Remain standing for the Eucharistic Prayer (B)



It is indeed right, our duty and our joy, always and everywhere to give you thanks, almighty and eternal Father, and in these days of Easter to celebrate with joyful hearts the memory of your wonderful works. For by the mystery of his passion Jesus Christ, your risen Son, has conquered the powers of death and hell and restored in men and women the image of your glory. He has placed them once more in paradise and opened to them the gate of life eternal. And so, in the joy of this Passover, earth and heaven resound with gladness, while angels and archangels and the powers of all creation sing for ever the hymn of your glory:



Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.


Jesus Christ is Lord:



And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.

As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of the blessed Virgin Mary, the Apostles, the Martyrs and all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord;



¶ Remain standing for the Lord's Prayer

Jesus taught us to call God our Father, and so we have the courage to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the **Breaking of the Bread**

Jesus says, I am the bread of life, whoever eats this bread will live for ever.


Lord, our hearts hunger for you; give us this bread always.

¶ Remain standing for the **Invitation to Communion**

Alleluia. Christ our passover is sacrificed for us.

Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia.

¶ Kneel or sit for the Lamb of God



Distribution of the Sacrament

Anyone who has been baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and wishes to receive the love of the Lord Jesus in their life, is welcome to receive Communion at this service. Alternatively you may wish to come for a blessing: please keep your hands down and your head bowed to indicate this.

<u>Intinction</u> is the practice of dipping the bread wafers into the wine. This has implications for those who are gluten intolerant because traces of gluten are more likely to enter the wine. We therefore ask you **not to dip the wafer into the chalice**. Please remember that making your Communion in one kind is entirely acceptable.

¶ Remain kneeling or seated for the **Communion Hymn**

Lord Jesus Christ, you have come to us, You are one with us, Mary's Son. Cleansing our souls from all their sin, Pouring your love and goodness in, Jesus, our love for you we sing, Living Lord.
