The Easter Vigil and First Mass of Easter



The Service of Light

The building being in darkness, the ministers go in silence to the main entrance, one of them carrying the unlit Easter candle.

All stand and face the Priest

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you and also with you. Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, on this most holy night, in which our Lord Jesus Christ passed over from death to life, the Church invites her children scattered throughout the world, to come together in vigil and prayer. This is the Passover of the Lord. If we remember his death and resurrection by hearing his word and celebrating his mysteries, then we shall have the sure hope of sharing his victory over death and living with him for ever in God.

Let us pray.

Father, we share in the light of your glory through your Son, the light of the world. Make this new fire † holy and inflame us with new hope. Purify our minds by this Easter celebration and bring us one day to the feast of eternal light. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Christ yesterday and today, the beginning and the end, Alpha and Omega, all time belongs to him, and all ages; to him be glory and power, through every age and for ever. **Amen.**

By his holy and glorious wounds may Christ our Lord guard and keep us. **Amen.**

The Priest lights the Easter candle with the taper, saying:

May the light of Christ, rising in glory, banish all darkness from our hearts and minds.

The minister bearing the candle enters the building, followed by the other ministers. They pause just inside the entrance.

The minister bearing the candle raises it and sings:

The light of Christ.

Thanks be to God.

As the members of the congregation enter the building their candles are lit by the taperers. The procession moves into the centre of the building and then stops.

The Exsultet

The Easter (Paschal) candle is placed on its stand. The congregation remains standing while the Exsultet (the Easter Song of Praise) is sung.

Rejoice, heavenly powers! Sing, choirs of angels! Exult, all creation around God's throne! Jesus Christ, our King, is risen! Sound the trumpet of salvation!

Rejoice, O earth in glory, radiant in the brightness of your triumphant King! Christ has conquered! Glory fills you! Darkness vanishes for ever!

Rejoice, O Mother Church! Exult in glory! The risen Saviour, our Lord of life, shines upon you! Let this place resound with joy, echoing the mighty song of all God's people!

My dearest friends, standing with me in this holy light, join me in asking God for mercy, that he may give his unworthy minister grace to sing his Easter praises.

The Lord be with you **and also with you.**

Lift up your hearts We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God

It is right to give him thanks and praise

The Exsultet continues util its conclusion:

May the Morning Star which never sets find this flame still burning: Christ, that Morning Star, who came back from the dead and shed his peaceful light on all mankind, your Son who lives and reigns for ever and ever.

The Liturgy of the Word

The Vigil Readings

The church remains in darkness throughout the readings. Each reading is followed by a Psalm or Canticle, after which there is a period of silence and finally a prayer, to which all respond: **Amen.**

Noah and the Flood (Genesis 7:1-5,11-18; 8: 6-19; 9: 8-13)

Responsorial Psalm (Ps. 36: 1-6)



Sin speaks to sinners in the depths of their hearts. There is no fear of God before their eyes. *(Response)* They so flatter themselves in their minds that they know not their guilt. In their mouths are mischief and deceit. All wisdom is gone. *(Response)* They plot the defeat of goodness as they lie on their bed. They have set their foot on evil ways, they cling to what is evil. (Response) Your love, Lord, reaches to heaven; your truth to the skies. Your justice is like God's mountain, your judgements like the deep. (Response)

Silence is kept

In baptism we died to sin. In Christ we are raised to life.

Grant, Lord, that we who are baptised into the death of your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, may continually put to death our evil desires and be buried with him; and that through the grave and gate of death we may pass to our joyful resurrection; through his merits, who died and was buried and rose again for us, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Crossing the Red Sea (Exodus 14: 10–31; 15: 1a)

Canticle: The Song of Moses and Miriam (Exodus 15)



I will sing to the Lord: glorious his triumph! Horse and rider he has thrown into the sea, the Lord is my strength, my song, my salvation. This is my God and I extol him, my father's God and I give him praise. *(Response)* The Lord is a warrior, the Lord is his name. The chariots of Pharoah he hurled into the sea, the deeps hide them; they sank like a stone. *(Response)*



Your right hand, O Lord, glorious in its power, your right hand, O Lord has shattered the enemy. In the greatness of your glory you crushed the foe. (*Response*)

You will lead them and plant them on your mountain, the place, O Lord, where you have made your home, the sanctuary, Lord, which your hands have made. The Lord will reign for ever and ever. *(Response)*

Silence is kept.

The Lord is my strength and my might.

He has become my salvation.

Lord God our redeemer, who heard the cry of your people and sent your servant Moses to lead them out of slavery: free us from the tyranny of sin and death and, by the leading of your Spirit, bring us to our promised land; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Come to the Water (Isaiah 55: 1–11)

Canticle (from Isaiah 12)



Truly God is my salvation, I trust, I shall not fear. For the Lord is my strength, my song, he became my saviour. (*Response*)

Give thanks to the Lord, give praise to his name! make his mighty deeds known to the peoples, declare the greatness of his name. *(Response)*

Sing a psalm to the Lord, for he has done glorious deeds, make them known to all the earth! People of Zion, sing and shout for joy for great in your midst is the Holy One of Israel. *(Response)*

Silence is kept.

Whoever comes to Christ will never be hungry. All who believe in Christ will never thirst.

Most merciful God, who by the death and resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ delivered and saved the world: grant that by faith in him who suffered on the cross we may triumph in the power of his victory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord. **Amen.**

¶ Stand for the Gloria in Excelsis

Priest: Glory to God in the highest

After the Priest has intoned the Gloria, bells are rung and the organ plays vigorously while lights and candles are lit to signify our passing from darkness to light. You should now extinguish your own candles. When this is complete we all sing the Gloria joyously and with great enthusiasm!





The priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise and honour, glory and might, now and in all eternity. **Amen.**

New Testament Reading (Romans 6: 3–11)

At the end of the reading: This is the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**


The Solemn Alleluia

The First Alleluia of Easter is sung with great solemnity, using a very ancient chant reserved exclusively for use during the Easter Vigil. The Priest first intones the Alleluia, which is then repeated by the choir and congregation. It is sung three times, each time higher than the last.



¶ All then join in singing the **Gospel Acclamation**







Cantor: He has defeated the powers of death.



Cantor: Jesus turns our sorrow into dancing.



Cantor: He has the words of eternal life.



The complete Alleluia, as sung at the start of the acclamation, is repeated.

Renewal of Baptismal promises

\P Stand for the **Prayer over the Water**

Almighty God, whose Son Jesus Christ was baptised in the river Jordan, we thank you for the gift of water to cleanse us and revive us. We thank you that through the waters of the Red Sea you led your

people out of slavery to freedom in the Promised Land.

We thank you that through the deep waters of death you brought your Son, and raised him to life in triumph.

We ask you, Father, with your Son to send the Holy Spirit upon the waters of this font. May all who are buried with Christ in the death of baptism rise also with him to newness of life, who is alive and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Decision

The priest addresses all present:

We all wander far from God and lose our way: Christ comes to find us and welcomes us home. In baptism we respond to his call.

Therefore I ask:

Do you reject Satan?	l do.
And all his works?	l do.
And all his empty promises?	l do.

Declaration of Faith

If your faith makes you ready to accept the responsibility of Christian living, renew now the vows of your own baptism. Reject sin; profess your faith in Christ Jesus. This is the faith of the Church. This is the faith in which we were all baptised. Do you believe and trust in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe and trust in his Son Jesus Christ?

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe and trust in the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

The Peace

The risen Christ came and stood among his disciples and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then were they glad when they saw the Lord. Alleluia, alleluia.

The peace of the risen Christ be always with you and also with you. Alleluia, alleluia.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

All may exchange a sign of peace, greeting one another with the words **Christ is risen** and giving the response **He is risen indeed.**

Offertory Hymn

At the Lamb's high feast we sing Praise to our victorious King; Who hath washed us in the tide Flowing from his piercèd side. Praise we him whose love divine Gives the guests his blood for wine, Gives his Body for the feast, Love the Victim, Love the Priest.

Where the Paschal blood is poured, Death's dark angel sheathes his sword; Israel's hosts triumphant go Through the wave that drowns the foe. Christ, the Lamb whose blood was shed, Paschal victim, Paschal bread! With sincerity and love Eat we Manna from above.

Eucharistic Prayer


The Lord be with you and also with you.

The priest recalls the Last Supper; the Deacon then sings: Jesus Christ is Lord:.



The Prayer continues, leading into the doxology, which concludes: almighty Father, for ever and ever.
