

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Welcoming of the Easter Candle

 \P Please turn to face the back when the bell is rung

Christ yesterday and today,

the beginning and the end,

Alpha and Omega, all time belongs to him, and all ages;

to him be glory and power, through every age and for ever. Amen. The Easter Candle is elevated

Alleluia. Christ is risen. **He is risen indeed.** Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. The acclamation is repeated twice more, getting louder each time.

This is the day when our Lord Jesus Christ was raised gloriously from the dead, crushing the power of sin and destroying the sting of death. Throughout the world Christians celebrate the mighty power of God as Christ calls us out of darkness to share in his marvellous light. May we, and all Christ's people, shine as lights in the world, to the glory of God the Father.

Prayers at the Easter Garden

Alleluia. Christ is risen.

He is risen indeed. Alleluia.

The angel said to the women, 'Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said.' (*Matthew 28: 5, 6*)

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. To you be glory now and for ever. In your great mercy you have given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. By your blessing, may we who have prepared this garden in celebration of his victory, be strengthened in faith, know the power of his presence, and rejoice in the hope of eternal glory. Blessed be God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. **Blessed be God for ever.**

Risen Lord Jesus, as Mary Magdalene met you in the garden on the morning of your resurrection, so may we meet you today and every day: speak to us as you spoke to her; reveal yourself as the living Lord; renew our hope and kindle our joy; and send us to share the good news with others. **Amen.**

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise and honour, glory and might, now and in all eternity. **Amen.**

¶ The Liturgy of the Word


¶ Sit for the First Reading (Acts 10: 34-43)

At the end the reader says: This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

¶ Remain seated for the Responsorial Psalm (Ps. 118)

and join in singing the Response



'His love has no end.' (Response)

The Lord's right hand has triumphed;

his right hand raised me up.

I shall not die, I shall live and recount his deeds. (Response)



The stone which the builders rejected has become the corner stone. This is the work of the Lord, a marvel in our eyes. (*Response*)

¶ Remain seated for the Second Reading

(1 Corinthians 15: 1–11)

At the end the reader says: This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

¶ Stand for the Gradual Hymn (Alleluia)

The strife is o'er, the battle done; Now is the Victor's triumph won; O let the song of praise be sung. Alleluia!

Death's mightiest powers have done their worst, And Jesus hath his foes dispersed; Let shouts of praise and joy outburst. Alleluia!

On the third morn he rose again Glorious in majesty to reign; O let us swell the joyful strain. Alleluia! .

¶ Stand for the **Declaration of Faith**

Let us declare our faith in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures; he was buried; he was raised to life on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures; afterwards he appeared to his followers, and to all the apostles: this we have received, and this we believe. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the Prayers of Intercession

To the bidding Father, by the victory of your Son Please respond by saying **Give light to the world.**

And at the end: Holy God, holy and strong, holy and immortal, have mercy on us. Lord Jesus Christ, risen from among the dead, you are with us every day until the end of time. Open our eyes to the sign of your presence.



Lord Jesus Christ, in the glory of God the Father, you are with us every day until the end of time. Open our hearts to the joy of your presence.



Lord Jesus Christ, you send us the Holy Spirit; you are with us every day until the end of time. Open our lives to the coming of your Spirit.

¶ The Liturgy of the Sacrament

¶ Remain standing for the **Peace**

God calls us to life:	In his word is our life.
God calls us to peace:	In his word is our peace.

The risen Christ came and stood among his disciples and said 'Peace be with you'. Then were they glad when they saw the Lord. The peace of the Lord be always with you **and also with you.**

Let us offer one another a sign of peace. All may exchange a sign of peace.

¶ Remain standing for the Offertory Hymn

A collection is taken for the mission and upkeep of the Church. The Altar is prepared and gifts of bread and wine are placed on it.

Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

Ye sons and daughters of the King, Whom heavenly hosts in glory sing, To-day the grave hath lost its sting. Alleluia!

On that first morning of the week, Before the day began to break, The Marys went their Lord to seek. Alleluia!

An angel bade their sorrow flee, For thus he spake unto the three: 'Your Lord is gone to Galilee.' Alleluia!

That night the Apostles met in fear, Amidst them came their Lord most dear, And said: 'Peace be unto you here!' Alleluia!

On this most holy day of days, To God your hearts and voices raise In laud, and jubilee, and praise. Alleluia!

And we with Holy Church unite, As evermore is just and right, In glory to the King of Light. Alleluia!



¶ Remain standing for the Prayer over the Gifts

Pray, my brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father.

May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of his name, for our good, and the good of all his holy Church.

Lord, receive our gifts in honour of the holy men and women who live with you in glory. May we always be aware of their concern to help and save us. **Amen.**



¶ Remain standing for the Eucharistic Prayer

We give you thanks and praise for the gospel we have received. Christ died for our sins. Alleluia.

He is risen indeed. Alleluia.

Death comes to all through Adam, and sin reigns for a time. New life without end comes through Christ, and he reigns for ever. Alleluia. **He is risen indeed. Alleluia.**

Death, where is your victory? Death, where is your sting? Death is swallowed up in victory, the victory you give us in Christ. Alleluia. **He is risen indeed. Alleluia.**

We have been crucified with Christ, and live his risen life, to praise you for ever with angels and archangels singing:




We praise and bless you, loving Father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord; and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit, that broken bread and wine outpoured may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you. He broke the bread, gave it to them and said: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Great is the mystery of faith:



Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth. Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Apostles, the Martyrs and all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, In the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.



¶ Remain standing for the Lord's Prayer

Let us pray with confidence as our Saviour has taught us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

I Remain standing for the **Breaking of the Bread**

Jesus says, I am the bread of life, whoever eats this bread will live for ever. Lord, our hearts hunger for you; give us this bread always.

¶ Remain standing for the Invitation to Communion

As we feed on the body and blood of the risen Jesus in bread and wine, may he be made known through our shared life together.

Alleluia. Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us. Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia.

Administration of the Blessed Sacrament

Anyone who has been baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and wishes to receive the love of the Lord Jesus in their life, is welcome to receive Communion at this service. Alternatively you may wish to come for a blessing: please keep your hands down and your head bowed to indicate this.

Intinction is the practice of dipping the bread wafers into the wine. This has implications for those who are gluten intolerant because traces of gluten are more likely to enter the wine. We therefore ask you **not to dip the wafer into the chalice**. please remember that making your Communion in one kind is entirely acceptable.

 \P Remain seated or kneeling for the ${\ensuremath{\textbf{Communion Hymn}}}$

The Priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

God of Life, who for our redemption gave your only-begotten Son to the death of the cross, and by his glorious resurrection have delivered us from the power of our enemy: grant us so to die daily to sin, that we may evermore live with him in the joy of his risen life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

¶ The Dismissal

¶ Remain standing for the **Solemn Blessing**

Alleluia. Christ is risen.

He is risen indeed. Alleluia.

God the Father, by whose love Christ was raised from the dead, open to you who believe the gates of everlasting life. **Amen.**

God the Son, who in bursting from the grave has won a glorious victory, give you joy as you share the Easter faith. **Amen.**

God the Holy Spirit, who filled the disciples with the life of the risen Lord, empower you and fill you with Christ's peace. **Amen.**

And the blessing of God almighty, † the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. **Amen.**

¶ Remain standing for the **Processional Hymn**

Jesus Christ is risen today, Alleluia! Our triumphant holy day, Alleluia! Who did once, upon the cross, Alleluia! Suffer to redeem our loss. Alleluia!

Hymns of praise then let us sing, Alleluia! Unto Christ, our heavenly King, Alleluia! Who endured the cross and grave, Alleluia! Sinners to redeem and save. Alleluia!

But the pains that he endured, Alleluia! Our salvation have procured, Alleluia! Now above the sky he's King, Alleluia! Where the angels ever sing. Alleluia!

¶ After a brief organ interlude, join in singing the Regina Cæli
