HOLY CROSS DAY

The cross on which our Lord was crucified has become the universal symbol for Christianity, replacing the fish symbol of the early church, though the latter has been revived in recent times. After the end of the persecution era, early in the fourth century, pilgrims began to travel to Jerusalem to visit and pray at the places associated with the life of Jesus. Helena, the mother of Emperor Constantine, was a Christian; while overseeing excavations in the city she is said to have uncovered a cross, which many believed to be the Cross of Christ. A basilica was built on the site of the Holy Sepulchre and dedicated on this day in the year 335.

The Priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

Almighty God, who in the passion of your blessed Son made an instrument of painful death to be for us the means of life and peace: grant us so to glory in the cross of Christ that we may gladly suffer for his sake; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

¶ The Liturgy of the Word

¶ Sit for the Bible Readings

(Numbers 21: 4-9; Philippians 2: 6-11)

At the end of each the reader says:

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

¶ Stand for the **Gradual Hymn** and turn towards the Gospel reader

Seek ye first the kingdom of God And his righteousness, And all these things shall be added unto you; Allelu, alleluia.

The priest addresses the whole congregation

Faith is the gift of God to his people. In baptism the Lord is adding to our number those whom he is calling. People of God, will you welcome Elodie Louise and uphold her in his new life in Christ?

With the help of God, we will.

The congregation sits and the priest then says to the parents and Godparents:

Parents and godparents, the Church receives Elodie Louise with joy. Today we are trusting God for her growth in faith. Will you pray for her, draw her by your example into the community of faith and walk with her in the way of Christ?

The parents and godparents reply

With the help of God, we will.

In baptism Elodie Louise begins her journey in faith. You speak for her today. Will you care for her, and help her to take her place within the life and worship of Christ's Church?

The parents and godparents reply

With the help of God, we will.

¶ Remain standing for **The Decision**

The priest addresses the candidates through their parents and godparents. All who have been baptised may renew the decision for themselves if they wish by joining in with the response

In baptism, God calls us out of darkness into his marvellous light. To follow Christ means dying to sin and rising to new life with him. Therefore I ask:

Do you turn to Christ? I turn to Christ.

Do you repent of your sins? I repent of my sins.

Do you renounce evil? I renounce evil.

¶ Remain standing for the Signing with the Cross

Elodie Louise, the Church welcomes you with great joy. In its name I claim you for Christ our Saviour by the sign of his Cross. We now trace the cross on your forehead: receive the sign of his cross.

The Priest makes the sign of the cross using the Holy Oil of Initiation.

Christ claims you for his own.

Do not be ashamed to confess the faith of Christ crucified.

Fight valiantly as a disciple of Christ against sin, the world and the devil, and remain faithful to Christ to the end of your life.

May almighty God deliver you from the powers of darkness, restore in you the image of his glory, and lead you in the light and obedience of Christ.

Amen.

 \P Remain standing for the **Procession to the Font** All turn to face the font.

¶ Remain standing for the **Prayer over the Water**

Praise God who made heaven and earth, who keeps his promise for ever.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

Almighty God, whose Son Jesus Christ was baptised in the river Jordan, we thank you for the gift of water to cleanse us and revive us. Saving God, **give us life.**

We thank you that through the waters of the Red Sea you led your people out of slavery to freedom in the Promised Land.

Saving God, give us life.

We thank you that through the deep waters of death you brought your Son, and raised him to life in triumph.

Saving God, give us life.

Bless this water, that your servants who are washed in it may be made one with Christ in his death and in his resurrection, to be cleansed and delivered from all sin.

Saving God, give us life.

Send your Holy Spirit upon them, bring them to new birth in the household of faith and raise them with Christ to full and eternal life; for all might, majesty, authority and power are yours, now and for ever. **Amen.**

¶ Remain standing for the **Affirmation of Faith**

We believe in God the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named.

We believe in God the Son, who lives in our hearts through faith, and fills us with his love.

We believe in God the Holy Spirit, who strengthens us with power from on high.

We believe in one God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the **Baptism**

The parents and godparents come to the front.

What names have you given your child?

Elodie Louise

What do you seek of God's Church for this child? **Baptism.**

Parents and Godparents, is it your will that Elodie Louise should be baptised in the faith of the Church, which we have all professed with you?

It is.

The priest pours water on the candidate, saying: Elodie Louise, I baptise you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

May God, who has received you by baptism into his Church, pour upon you the riches of his grace, that within the company of Christ's pilgrim people you may daily be renewed by his anointing Spirit, and come to the inheritance of the saints in glory. **Amen.**

¶ Remain standing for the **Prayers of Intercession**

The Priest introduces the prayers.

To the bidding Lord, hear us. please respond by saying Lord, graciously hear us.

After the prayer for the departed, the following responses are said:

Rest eternal grant unto them, O Lord, and let light perpetual shine upon them.

May they rest in peace and rise in glory.

At the end of the Intercessions the priest introduces a period of silent reflection and says a concluding prayer.

¶ Remain standing for the **Penitential Rite**

'Come,' say the Spirit and the Bride. 'Come forward, you who are thirsty, receive the water of life, the free gift to all who desire it.'

May almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you your sins, and bring you to everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The people are sprinkled with water and the baptismal party return to the front of the church where they may be joined by others who have recently been baptised.

¶ Remain standing for the **Welcome**

There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism: by one Spirit we are all baptised into one body.

We welcome you into the fellowship of faith; we are children of the same heavenly Father; we welcome you.

The congregation greets the newly baptised.

¶ The Liturgy of the Sacrament

¶ Stand for the **Peace**

We are the body of Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised into one body. Let us then pursue all that makes for peace and builds up our common life.

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

¶ Remain standing for the **Offertory Hymn**

A collection is taken for the mission and upkeep of the church. The Altar is prepared and bread and wine are placed on it.

Stand up! stand up for Jesus, Ye soldiers of the cross; Lilft high his royal banner, It must not suffer loss. From victory unto victory His army he shall lead; Till every foe is vanquished, And Christ is Lord indeed.

¶ Remain standing throughout the **Eucharistic Prayer (E)**





It is indeed right and good, our duty and our joy, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Today we celebrate with songs of praise the cross, the victory-sign of Christ. Once through the fruit of the forbidden tree we fell, now through this tree our Saviour cancels all our sin.

An instrument of shameful death has become for Christ a throne of glory. The power of the life-giving cross reveals the judgement that has come upon the world and the triumph of Christ crucified.

And so, with choirs of angels and with all the heavenly host, we proclaim your glory and join their unending hymn of praise:





We praise and bless you, loving father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord; and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit, that broken bread and wine outpoured may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you. He broke the bread, gave it to them and said: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Great is the mystery of faith:



Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth. Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with the Blessed Virgin Mary and all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.



¶ Remain standing for the Lord's Prayer

Jesus taught us to call God our Father, and so we have the courage to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ Remain standing for the Breaking of the Bread


We break this bread to share in the body of Christ. Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

¶ Remain standing for the **Invitation to Communion**

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

¶ Kneel or sit for the Lamb of God



Distribution of the Sacrament

Anyone who has been baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and wishes to receive the love of the Lord Jesus in their life, is welcome to receive communion at this service. The Chalice is there for those who wish to receive it. If you are worried about receiving the Chalice, please remember that making your Communion in one kind is entirely valid. We ask you not to dip the wafer into the chalice.

Alternatively you may wish to come for a blessing: please keep your hands down and your head bowed to indicate that this is your preference.

¶ Remain kneeling or seated for the Communion Motet

The Priest introduces a period of silent prayer with the words Let us pray.

Faithful God, whose Son bore our sins in his body on the tree and gave us this sacrament to show forth his death until he comes: give us grace to glory in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, for he is our salvation, our life and our hope, who reigns as Lord, now and for ever. **Amen.**

¶ The Dismissal

¶ Remain standing for the **Dismissal Gospel**

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus said, 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

¶ Remain standing for the **Blessing**

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Please bow your heads and pray for God's blessing.

May God, who gives patience and encouragement, give you a spirit of unity to live in harmony as you follow Jesus Christ, so that with one voice you may glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. And the blessing of God almighty, † the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. **Amen.**

¶ Remain standing for the Final Hymn

Come, Christians, follow where the Master trod, Our King victorious, Christ the Son of God.
